The reason projects fail is typically not due to poor technology or project management, but due to people related challenges including poor technology adoption, under-utilisation of data or failure to transition to associated new ways of working. Success is achieved when people on the frontline change how they do their work – this is critical to realising efficiencies and delivering value from any new project. Supervisors have the greatest influence on how frontline work gets done, not the CEO, department heads and definitely not project managers. While training, communications and specialist change management engagements are important, it is supervisors who hold the keys to reinforcing the day-to-day actions of employees. Without collective leadership or supervisors across all levels of an organisation prioritising the use of new technology and ensuring new ways of working are being consistently implemented, change won't be sustained.

Collective Leadership Activation is an innovative new approach to activating supervisors, often referred to as the frozen middle, to champion project related change. Matt Dragun - Change Leader, Innovator & Disruptor - who is a change leader with 15 years' senior management experience in overseeing transformational projects across the globe, having supported major transformation programs within the construction, property, oil & gas and resources sectors, has presented an insightful session where our members could learned how their projects can benefit from this method to accelerate the adoption of new technologies and ways of working and maximise benefit realisation.

Matae, is a world first change leadership platform that helps organisations roll-out new technologies and ways of working faster together through better change leadership. Matt is a current participant in the EY Foundry APAC Start-up Incubator Program and his disruptor change leadership software Matae has a unique approach to how organisations can embed change as BAU to take advantage of global trends.



I would like to share with you all an interview by one of our volunteer Daniel Simpson, with one of our time-honoured volunteer, Mr. Ivor Halford, who has been a volunteer with the Melbourne Chapter for the last 25 years and has dedicated his time and energy towards making a positive impact on the community. Ivor's unwavering commitment to giving back to the community and supporting the project management profession has been truly remarkable.

Here you go......

Daniel Simpson: You have been an active volunteer with us for 25 years, Ivor, what a milestone - take us back to life as a project manager in 1998 and what made you decide to get involved with the PMI in the first place?

Ivor Halford: That's a good question, so back in 1998 I was working or I just moved from ICI/ Orica to Coles Myer. I had been a project manager at ICI for half a dozen years or so. I was in the network team doing, you know, delivery, installs, the whole lot. So I moved out of that team into project management and then then moved again into Coles and I've sort of mainly been involved in the infrastructure side of things in IT.

I just felt like I wouldn't mind getting some level of formal recognition for being a project manager, also just to improve my knowledge of project management; I also wanted to meet up with like-minded people in the project management game. So I moved to Coles Myer and basically at that point I joined the (PMI Melbourne) chapter. It actually coincided with me having a manager who was very supportive of us getting recognition as project managers. So we asked, would he help us get certified? And so a number of us undertook some training while we were at work. Training was from Kevin Burke, who's another long-time member of PMI and a former director who's been an education provider for PMI as well. Terrific bloke, Kevin. And he would come in once a week and give a group of us some training and then and then a few months later I got my PMP certification. That was around about 1999 and soon after I went to one of the first PMI Chapter meetings and that was at Dorcas St, South Melbourne, that's where the first event that I went to, and at the time they were asking for volunteers.

So I just put my hand up and joined the events team and 25 years later I was still on the events team. I've also been involved in the Chapter Board Election Committee a couple of times. It's been probably another couple of things along the way, but predominantly it's been as a member of the events team, always a really good bunch of people. I would get asked 'won't you come and join the board?" But I just wanted something that would get me there to the chapter events, but something I could also walk away from because I was already heavily involved in my sporting clubs and on committees and whatever



else. And I just didn't really want to get too committed from being on the board, but I was happy to be involved with the events team so that's what sort of kept me motivated, because that was my starting point.

Daniel Simpson: And so by maintaining that level of involvement, you would be able to maintain the motivation to keep contributing and volunteering?

Ivor Halford: Correct. So yes, as you say the motivation has really been maintained. It gets me there. I feel I'm contributing something back. You get wonderful insights at all the events.

So, to be truthful, it's probably been more intense the last probably few years, since Covid has come along where the Events team has got more involved with critiquing the presentations, assisting with the setup and so it has taken a bit more involvement but at the same time there's been a number of people moving through and assisting on the events team. And you do also pick up some new skills and ideas and ways of running events as well. So that's also been a handy learning.

Daniel Simpson: It's always good to have another string in the bow, isn't it?

Ivor Halford: Yes, it is.

Daniel Simpson: And those hybrid events over the last couple of years looked particularly complex to set up.

Ivor Halford: That's right.

Daniel Simpson: I remember turning up to a few of those pretty early...

Ivor Halford: Yeah, I know that's right. Especially when we're in the first few, I mean big hats off to the Events team. We'd always run onsite events. We'd never run online events. Then when COVID came we switched from on-site to online and so that was a big move just to do that and to keep the momentum of the monthly events going. So that in itself was a big move.

And then we when we switched back to having a one or two in person events. Then we switched to hybrid events.

And yeah, that was initially quite a challenge as well. Big hats off to Keen who set up the first of the online events and then also huge hats off to Jeferson who kicked off the hybrid events and that's what's been maintained since with the Events team. I'm not sure if you're aware, but I've stepped down from the events team.

Earlier this year because I thought, no, it's time to have a bit of a break. But yeah, I mean the motivation is pretty well the same motivation I had 25 years ago, to be truthful.



Daniel Simpson: And that's to give something back, while also be able to maintain some work/life balance?

Ivor Halford: Yes and the volunteering is just what gets me there (to the Chapter events). It forced me to get involved.

I needed a bit of a break and I'm so busy at work but it just shows you when before even if I was busy, I still had to get involved and so and it just forced me to get there and you pick up something every time (at the Chapter events).

I've seen some wonderful people presenting, subject matter experts and leaders in the industry. The beauty about the hybrid events too, we've had some overseas people present as well.

Daniel Simpson: Yes, I wanted to ask, did you have an all-time favourite event or speaker?

Ivor Halford: Oh, that's a really tricky one. I mean, to be truthful, I always enjoy the end of year events.

I think one event we had a comedian in, trying to think who it was, but he was imitating being a professor of project management at senior government level and that was quite amusing.

That was a few years ago, but, it's really difficult to sort of nail down one event over the others because I've seen so many. I won't be doing the events justice by trying to pick one over the other.

Yeah, I think I think it was good when we had our first end of year event as an online event, when we had the magician, did you go, did you?

Daniel Simpson: Yes.
